Steve Layman, 915 Hawthorne Ln. – I'm a member of the partnership that owns both of these parcels, actually there are 3 parcels involved, there is a combination of zoning, one has already been zoned Single-Family Residential, we've been trying for 10 years how to build this and we think we've finally figured it out. There's about 25 acres involved between the 3 parcels, 20 of which you are re-zoning tonight and we want to put 66 single family home sites on the property.

COMMENTS FROM CITIZENS

Mr. Stephen Smith, 237 Violet Ct. – Before I start I just wanted to say I appreciate the good work that Service Director Rhodes and the Street Dept. did replacing the storm sewer by our house. They did the work quickly, efficiently and very well as far as I could see. I was very appreciative of that. On November 1st I was here and several people spoke and I was very dismayed by the lack of compassion I heard on the part of some of the speakers and some of the Council Members. There are several things I want to address, providing low barrier housing for the homeless is actually a money saver based on situations in some other states when comparing the cost of services or housing a homeless person. So not only is it the right thing to do, but it is fiscally responsible. Another issue, fentanyl testing strips and their legality. Many National drug and healthcare serviced support the distribution of fentanyl test strips. They are proven to save lives. I totally don't approve of people using illegal drugs and they should be provided treatment but they have to survive to get that treatment. I realize they are illegal, but bad laws can be changed. I've personally contacted my State Representatives to ask about this. I did get a response from Jay Hottinger who said he would send it up the Health Commission Chair. Hopefully if others would add their voices to that it would get attention. The last thing I want to address is someone spoke about privatized policing or vigilantes and made the statement, an armed society is a polite society. This has been used a lot by gun advocates. That phrase actually came from a novel that was written in the 1940's, it was an anti-utopian novel, but was taken out of context. A gun is not a defensive weapon it is an offensive weapon.

Several statistics were quoted related to gun ownership and crimes. You are more likely to get hit by a bullet than a car. The statistics are clear that you are more likely to be hurt by that weapon than you are to use it for protection.

Desiree Blake, 125 S. Second St. – I just want to thank Mr. Rhodes and his department for filling the holes on Fleek, they've been there many time this year filling those up and I hear that Fleek is going to get fixed next year hopefully, so we won't have that, with winter coming and stuff, the street's small and I just don't want people to hit my car. Another thing I would like to thank the police department for going over to the garage next door to me, the homeless have been setting fires trying to stay warm and I tried to tell them you're not allowed to stay there but they were there again and the police came and helped clean that mess up. So, I'm hoping that the landlord will do something about the garage, tear it down, the roof is about ready to fall down before someone gets in there and really hurts themselves. If it does fall, then the one beside it will catch and then it will come to my side and then we'll talk about something. Otherwise I just want to thank the police department and property maintenance I appreciate that.

Jessie, Homeless – I'm currently homeless because I helped people out that were homeless, that got me in trouble. Me and my husband have been trying to find a place. The crime rate is going up because of homeless people too. I think there needs to be an apartment complex or something that homeless people can get into because a lot of landlords won't rent to you if you have a background. Those people then end up breaking the law. Salvation Army and other places are packed and you can't get in. Newark has more services for homeless than Lancaster and people from Lancaster and other counties are coming here because of that, but they need to know it's not like what they think it is and they end up in tents. Some of the crimes they do are just them trying to survive and they don't have a choice. They want help but it's not there for them. I want to help these people but I don't know what to do, so someone said for me to come here and speak, that's the beginning. One person I have known a long time, I grew up with her. I'm asking for help for them, it will help the police too. People deserve the help if they want it bad enough. Some of my friends want help but they can never get ahead. God tells me to give people a second chance because people deserve a second chance. I don't want to see any of them die during the winter that would be devastating.

President Ellington – I feel bad for your situation, the homeless situation, but just speaking for me, I'm not sure the City is responsible for housing the homeless. I just don't know how we would do that.

Rochelle Volen – Smith. 237 Violet Ct. – I too would like to thank the Newark Street Maintenance workers for the repair of a caving storm drain on Green Meadow, due to the long detours it took a toll on our street and I am grateful for the fine work. I'm also grateful for the Rotary Club playground it's step in the right direction for children and adults, but it does currently need some repair work. On November 1st there was a suggestion of substituting the police with other options, I personally feel there can be improvement with education but I do not feel a change is necessary as far as policing is concerned. I want to comment on an armed society is a polite society. I think that is a misquote. Gun purchases during the season of enlightenment and peace seem extremely inappropriate. I don't believe arming society makes them polite, I believe teaching them alternatives is a better solution. By the way it says in the constitution a well regulated militia, not that everybody should have a gun. About the City's drug problem, it's easier to treat the symptoms not the problem. There have been many articles on how pharmaceutical companies have pushed drugs on people without be able giving people the details of the side effects. Opioids have been given to people the help them work through pain and they weren't told how addictive it could be. I feel society has added to the problem. As far as the fentanyl strips, they are intend to test for the unintended presence of the drug, we need that to prevent human loss. Several years ago council announced it was closing several bars and instead we've increased the availability without monitoring how much alcohol is purchased. We've served meals to people in our back yard who have spent too much on alcohol and can't afford to feed their children. We need to consider monitoring the alcohol situation. These are troubled times and people turn to these troubling behaviors. We need to pay attention to all of these problems. I like that we are using mental health services that is also part of the problem.

Daniel Crawford, 163 S. Second Street – I want to say a number of things first I want to say I'm happy to see Dee back. She was gone a big portion of this year I was really worried about her, I haven't even seen her in the store as of late. Also congratulations to everyone who won. It's ever fun to lose, but it's always an awesome experience to be approved to be on the ballot as an option. So, once again thank you for that opportunity. They will assist you in getting back to where you want to be. Not just Newark and Licking County is a place to get goods and services. I agree stop treating the symptoms, get to the root of the problem and try to make sure that we address that. I want to say thank you to David Rhodes and Barbara Gilkes, it's been about 4 years I've been asking to have a dog park in the 3rd ward and we're finally getting one in Reddington Park and I believe construction was scheduled to start today. Very excited about that. Mr. Steve Layman, I just wanted to tell him, welcome to the neighborhood. Building 61 homes on Chery Valley Rd., very much looking forward to that development. Congratulations to Jerry Wray, very proud of him, very proud of all our 3rd ward residents, Jerry is a 3rd Ward resident very proud of that. I appreciate all the comments and all the opinions tonight, appreciate your interpretation of the 2nd amendment, although I prefer to rely on the Supreme Court for that thank goodness and I guess I'll sum it up with one of my favorite quotes that reminded me of and that is that 47.6% of all statistics are made up on the spot. If you want to quote me on that, I'll repeat it, 34.8% of all statistics are made up on the spot.

Mr. Barker – I just would echo everyone's comments. We always say that we give truth here. That's one thing I want to point out. Everyone on the council comes here we then take all that feedback back and with the administration and council and with safety forces and Safety Director we have these discussions and we get those calls. So it doesn't stop her, it continues on for us 24/7 when we leave this chamber so we do care very much. I want to do a couple thank you's, Director Rhodes I appreciate his help with a fence issue that was, I don't understand how someone puts a fence 2 feet over on

someone elses property and thinks it's theirs, but Director Rhodes and the Engineering, Department of Zoning helped out greatly,. To get this resolved. I also want to thank Roger Loomis and our Water Department team, sometimes they don't get the shout outs they deserve. The day before Thanksgiving I called Roger and said Roger there's water running down my street and I don't know where it's coming from. Roger promptly said why don't you just go plug the hole and I said I don't know where it's coming from. And about 5 minutes after that the water team was there. I don't know what the issue was but it got stopped about 30 minutes later, so this is the time of the year where the cold can affect our water system and Roger you and your team do great work and we and the citizens really appreciate that. I want to say Dee hall, fantastic to have you back. Very good to see you, I know we talked on the phone a couple times as you were going through everything and it's just good to see you here tonight.

Mr. Blake – Welcome to Dee Hall I'm glad that you're I good health and returned to council, so welcome back. I do want to give some thank you's to Licking Memorial Hospital, Job and Family Services, United Way and the Licking County Foundation, this year I have continued to work with them on funding a neighborhood outreach specialist with a focus on addiction and mental health concerns, that person has finally been hired, they started last week, so they are out there doing good work. Many comments were made about the homeless population and how to address it and one of the avenues that I've been focusing on was specifically looking at addiction and mental health concerns, so that is going to help greatly .I just want to give a report to Council that the Care Now Clinic that opened up across from Speedway on East Main Street has been seeing about a dozen clients a day and so it's most definitely a needed resource that's been needed for a while and word is getting out to the right folks to get care there. It's dealing with substance abuse and mental health issues, trying to get folks into the right avenue of care for the people out on the streets and needing that care BHP is doing a great job with those topics. I wat to give a big thanks to Chief Connor, on a side note, I remember when my grandmother passed Chief Connor and the Fire Department came and handled the situation and we as men don't say these things too often, but me and the Chief gave a big hug and I will always remember that and appreciate the compassion and care that he gave and he's done good thing for the city but that's just a personal thing that I will always remember him before beside just being there. I wish him best of luck in his new endeavor, but just wanted to thank him publicly for everything he did especially for my family. Other comments that were made, Daniel has left, but I do appreciate him bringing up Linda Lovell. Linda was a member of my church congregation and she was very passionate about public transportation and advocating for issues and Linda was a great person and I'm glad he brought her up tonight that was very fitting. Everyone stay warm, stay safe and stay healthy.

President Ellington – Dee, glad to see you back at council, we missed you. I'd like to thank everyone who spoke tonight we all appreciate your opinions. You may not agree with some of the things we say, but we certainly appreciate you coming and letting us know how you feel. This is your Newark City Council. Our next and last Committee meeting will be December 20th at 5:45pm and our next and last full Council meeting for this year will be that same night the 20th at 7:00pm.
