COMMENTS FROM CITIZENS

William Butcher- 129 W Main St, stated that the address for the house on S 6^{th} St is 160 S 6^{th} St.

Paul Moran- $63 \text{ N } 4^{\text{th}}$ St, voiced his concern regarding signs and posts left behind after the paving had occurred on Granville and Main St. Commented that the City of Heath is getting a railroad crossing repaired.

Ms. Lesa Best- 205 W Church St, inquired if Resolution No. 12-71 was the legislation that a public hearing is coming up for. She also inquired as to why it was passed before we heard from the public.

Ms. Best wanted to answer a few questions regarding why we need and the purposes for licensing rental properties. She stated that rental licensing prohibits the promotion of and the charging for a two bathroom home when only one works; she stated she has seen that happen twice. She went on to say that it encourages ethical and honest business dealings so that the business and the community thrives, encourages better tenant behavior and thus better tenants, will help to end the use of grants and public funds to continuously bail out negligent landlords that could be utilized to assist homeowners with the maintenance of their homes, it prevents the rental of sub-standard housing and shows that the City does not approve of sub-standard housing and the careless attitude towards human life. She also stated that if a business shows flagrant abuse of the public trust they would not be permitted to do business in Newark or at least she hoped there wouldn't be permitted. She believes that the rental business should not be exempt to this. She stated that taking advantage of the desperate or poorly educated would not be tolerated, encourages maintenance and rehabs in order to be able to rent the home, requires landlords to be responsible for the maintenance and self-inspections. Basic human needs when renting would be fulfilled, such as electric, heat, and water or plumbing. She also believes that it would end the work for deposit deals, and would inform the potential renter that the rental is on record as being fit for occupancy. It allows of the actual and factual counting of rental properties in the City of Newark, it would promote the good landlord if a list of licensed rentals were published to be distributed to agencies, charities, media and City buildings for the potential renters. She believes that it would increase the good will on the part of the community towards landlords as a whole when they are contributing to the cost of monitoring their own business and eliminating blight. She stated that when we regulate businesses to protect the public, we are focusing on the people who receive the services. Punishment is for those who break the law; regulation is to reduce those who do.

Mr. Ellington- stated that regarding 12-71 he believes that this is a request for funds from HUD and the public meetings are to discuss how we are going to spend them.

ADMINISTRATION

Law Director- stated that Monday was the $50^{\rm th}$ anniversary of James Meredith enrolling in the University of Mississippi and encouraged everyone if they did not know the story to Google it.

Mayor Hall- addressed three comments made by citizens. 1) Mayor Hall stated that the City is in dialogue with the railroads regarding repairs of the 30th St crossing. He stated that it doesn't happen quickly and probably not this year but the renders that the City has been shown include pedestrian crossing. The railroads have consented that they will do it they are now just trying to find out when that will be.

2) He informed everyone that the signage that was left on Granville and W Main is property of the contractor that was hired to do the paving and that there is still work to be completed there perhaps that is why the signage remains however they would look into it.

3) He stated that tonight Council passed legislation allowing the City to apply for CDBG funds with no details. On October 9th there will be a public hearing and those will be conducted until November 8, the public can come and voice their opinion on the spending of those funds. Because it is public dollars they have to have Council approval to even apply for funds.

Lastly, tonight there was a candle lighting vigil regarding breast cancer that the City does every year. There were two breast cancer survivors who spoke. He encouraged everyone to note the courthouse lights at the top are pink and will be the whole month of October, it breast cancer awareness month.

Ms. Stare- advised William Butcher that she would go past the address on S 6th St that he mentioned during his comments. She stated that she would give a report to Property Maintenance and that the last few things she has given to them they have taken care of efficiently. Congratulated Stephen Johnson and his staff for the award. She wanted to acknowledge the Newark Garden Club for the lovely flower beds around Newark.

Mr. Cost- congratulated Stephen Johnson

Mrs. Floyd- congratulated Stephen Johnson. She stated that the 7^{th} ward held a block watch meeting this past Saturday and 20 people showed up. One of the main concerns they had was with drug dealing in their neighborhood and what they can do about it.

Mr. Guthrie- congratulated Stephen Johnson and stated that he considered him a friend and that the City was lucky to have him as our Auditor.

Mr. Houdeshell- congratulated Stephen Johnson. Stated that there is a block watch tomorrow in his ward. He stated that last month his ward's block watch went to the Police Station and received information on meth. They were told about how it was made and what to look for.

Mrs. Loomis- congratulated Mr. Johnson. She stated that the award was well deserved, that his office is always very professional and patient. She stated that she will not be calling a meeting on rental registration because she did not feel as though it would be productive and there are still questions from the Law Director and Council. She encouraged the Economic Development Committee to continue to review the information in order to be prepared with questions. She stated that they could give their questions or comments to Lesa Best at rentalregistration@hotmail.com. She stated that there isn't legislation at this time.

Mr. Ellington- stated that Mr. Guthrie needs to call a Safety Committee meeting and Mr. Rath has asked him to call for a Service Committee meeting since he is absent

Mr. Marmie- called for a Finance Committee meeting. Congratulated Stephen Johnson and his team. He appreciates the information that his staff always helps him with getting quickly and efficiently. He also clarified that the CDBG legislation was an application. He stated that they did ask for additional information that theu have not asked for in the past; Mr. Mauter did supply the information, nothing specific but he did give them a general plan because there are a lot of numbers unknown. He stated that they did a get a timeline and that the department is working on their budget.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no other business to discuss a motion by Mrs. Loomis to adjourn was made, second by Mr. Marmie. Motion carried by acclamation and the meeting was adjourned at 7:31 P.M.
