EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this study is to create a comprehensive overview of the existing and previous conditions of northeast Newark, capture potential issues, and provide enough information to guide cohesive development in the future. The findings from this study were achieved through a combination of public engagement, data aggregation, and cross-analysis of previous plans. Future action in the northeast Newark area should be guided by a steering committee of residents, city officials, engineers, local business owners, and developers to ensure that development aligns and responds to the needs and wants of the region.

The results of this study show that there is room for growth in the northeast Newark area. With considerable regional economic growth and investments by major corporations in Licking County, population growth is expected to continue across the region. Currently, there is capacity to accommodate an additional 20,000 customers with the current wastewater treatment infrastructure, as well as capacity to support expanded electricity use. Broadband internet infrastructure will be needed in the northernmost communities in the study area.

Like much of Central Ohio, housing availability and affordability is limited in the study area. In the past four years, approximately 187 new units have been constructed. This supply is insufficient for the demand. In general, homeowners have a higher income and spend a smaller percentage of their earnings on housing. However, to support aging in place and the young generation of employees, future development must consider unit affordability to reduce the housing cost burden.

The results of this study also show that transportation efficiency and safety are a top priority for residents in the region. During peak travel times, Horns Hill Road records high congestion, both caused by daily commuters and by student pick-up and drop-off at Horns Hill Elementary School. Adding infrastructure to reduce congestion, such as sidewalks or road modifications, may be successful, but the nearby North Fork Licking River and restrictions associated with a federally regulated floodplain pose significant challenges. Redirecting traffic to alternative routes and incentivizing public transportation and

carpooling may help reduce traffic congestion in the future.

Active transportation and recreation are supported in the region, yet the infrastructure is not fully developed. Residents are interested in traveling to Horns Hill Park by active means, as well as connecting sidewalks along Horns Hill Road to support safe routes to school, active recreation, and alternative means of travel. As population growth continues in the region, creating infrastructure that supports healthy living and alternative modes of travel can increase resident satisfaction and reduce congestion from traffic.

When describing the study area in a few words or less, residents overwhelmingly described the area as a quiet area with a "country feel." Residents placed a strong value on trees, greenspace, and outdoor tranquility. Currently, greenspace is limited to the southern section of the study area. Preserving greenspace will maintain regional resilience to extreme weather events, such as heat, drought, severe storms, and flooding. Future development should be conscious of the community's value for seclusion and set aside ample greenspace between developments to maintain the sense of tranquility and connection to the local environment.

The findings from this study and previous visioning studies demonstrate that the public is highly engaged in the planning process and willing to steer the process. The public is inspired by other Central Ohio communities of similar characteristics and strives to improve cleanliness, safety, and prosperity for the region. Furthermore, the public is eager to shop locally, dine locally, and enjoy the amenities that the City of Newark and surrounding townships have to offer. There is a bright future for the northeast Newark area.

BACKGROUND STUDY

BACKGROUND

PURPOSE AND NEED

The Horns Hill Road corridor between Waterworks Road and the City Limits is currently witnessing significant growth in residential development, driven by the availability of sizable developable tracts of land within the corridor. Recognizing this surge, the City of Newark, which has jurisdiction over half of the area, is taking steps to proactively address the need for coordinated development. This region, Snyder Road / Wilkins Road to the North, Waterworks Road to the South, State Route 79 to the East, and State Route 13 to the West, holds additional potential for expansion through annexation.

The City of Newark, with assistance from Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC), has conducted this visioning study as part of its forward-looking strategy. While the City currently lacks the resources and expertise to immediately ensure well-coordinated development, this study aims to provide a valuable framework that will inform future planning efforts. By analyzing current conditions and identifying key opportunities and challenges, the study will serve as a helpful resource should the City choose to proceed with a more formalized development plan for the corridor in the future. This process will allow for more informed decision-making that aligns with the community's needs and aspirations, without committing to any specific course of action at this stage.

The planning process involves several key steps, starting with a review of previous studies and plans related to the corridor, along with an assessment of current regulations. Public engagement is central to this effort, allowing the community to provide valuable input on the corridor's future, through survey questionnaires. The process also examines potential regulations for future redevelopment and explores streetscape designs that prioritize safety and accessibility for all users. The resulting document will outline a forward-looking but achievable vision for the corridor, including policy recommendations, proposed roadway and streetscape improvements, and strategies for securing funding and implementing the plan.

STUDY AREA

The Horns Hill Road Corridor, located in the northeast part of Newark, consists of a 2.6 mile stretch of Horns Hill Road, spanning between Snyder Road / Wilkins Road to the North and Waterworks Road to the South. The area is well connected via several state routes – State Route 16 is only two miles south of the corridor, State Route 79 is only a mile and a half to the east, and State Route 13 is only a half mile to the west. The entirety of the corridor is located east of the North Fork Licking River. Jurisdictions included within the study area are the City of Newark, Newton Township, Mary Ann Township, Madison Township, and Newark Township.




Figure 1. Study Area Boundary

AREA OVERVEW

DEMOGRAPHY, SOCIOECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS, AND WORKFORCE

The population of the City of Newark, Ohio, has experienced steady growth over the past two decades, according to data from the decennial censuses of 2000, 2010, and 2020. In the year 2000, Newark's population was recorded at 46,279. By the year 2010, the population had grown to 47,573, reflecting a modest increase of approximately 2.8% over the decade.

The trend of gradual growth continued into the next decade. By the 2020 Census, Newark's population had reached 49,934. This represents an increase of around 5% from 2010 to 2020. The overall growth between 2000 and 2020 indicates that Newark has been experiencing consistent, albeit slow, population growth over the last two decades, with a total increase of approximately 7.9% over the twenty-year period. This growth reflects broader patterns of gradual urban expansion in smaller cities, where moderate population increases are often tied to stable local economies and regional attractiveness for new residents. Factors contributing to Newark's steady growth could include its proximity to Columbus, Ohio, and the appeal of more affordable housing options compared to larger urban areas.

While the growth rate has not been rapid, it indicates a positive trajectory for Newark, suggesting resilience and an ongoing attraction for residents. However, the relatively modest rate of increase compared to larger metropolitan areas may indicate challenges in attracting younger demographics or new economic opportunities. Understanding these trends is crucial for future city planning, infrastructure development, and community services to ensure the continued well-being of Newark's residents and maintain a balance between growth and sustainability.

INCOME

Both median and mean incomes in Newark have increased significantly, with median income rising by 47% and mean income by 42% from 2013 to 2022. The proportion of households earning less than \$10,000 decreased from 10.1% in 2013 to 6.1% in 2022, suggesting economic improvement for the lowest earners. The number of households earning more than \$100,000 grew significantly, from 7% in 2013 to 12.9% in 2022, indicating an expanding middle-to-upper-income segment. The \$35,000 to \$49,999 group remained fairly consistent, while households earning between \$50,000 and \$74,999 grew toward the end of the period, reflecting stability in the middle-income sector. The greater rise in mean income compared to median income indicates that higher-income earners may have experienced larger income gains, highlighting potential disparities that could impact housing affordability and economic equity.




Figure 2. Income in The Past 12 Months (Inflation Adjusted)

SCHOOL DISTRICT

The City of Newark school district serves approximately 6,500 students in 13 buildings. The district includes seven elementary schools (Grades K-5), three middle schools (Grades 6-8), one high school (Grades 9-12), and one digital academy (Grades 1-12). It is the largest school district in Licking County. According to the Newark City Schools attendance boundary maps, the study area is served by Hillview Elementary School, Heritage Middle School, and Newark High School.

Student count has maintained stability over the last few years. In FY 2020, approximately 6,000 students were enrolled in Grades 1-12, and 570 students were enrolled in kindergarten. By 2023, student enrollment has dropped 3% to approximately 5,540 students, according to the Newark City School District fiscal report. School operations are supported by personnel of over 800 staff, including teachers, support staff, and administrators.



COMMUTE TO WORK

Commuting choices in Newark are heavily influenced by income, with higher-income earners favoring private vehicles and remote work, while lower-income groups rely more on carpooling, public transit, and walking. These patterns can inform transportation planning, highlighting areas where expanded transit options or improved walkability could enhance access to work for lower-income residents.

- » Driving alone is the dominant mode of transportation across all income groups, but it is most prevalent among middle- and high-income earners, indicating greater access to personal vehicles as income rises.
- » Carpooling is more common among lower-income groups, likely as a cost-saving measure, and declines significantly in higher income brackets.
- » Public transportation use is minimal and primarily concentrated in the lowest income group, suggesting either limited access to transit or that higher earners prefer more convenient options.
- » Walking and alternative means (taxicabs, motorcycles, bicycles) are more prevalent in lower-income brackets, reflecting limited vehicle ownership or proximity to workplaces.
- » Working from home becomes increasingly common as income rises, with the highest number of remote workers found in the \$75,000 or more income group. This suggests that higher-paying jobs are more likely to offer the flexibility of remote work.

TRANSPORTATION

COMPLETE STREETS & SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

The transportation section of this study examines opportunities to enhance connectivity, safety, and accessibility throughout Newark. We have analyzed the existing Complete Streets legislation to assess how roadways currently accommodate all users — pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists. The Safe Routes to School program is also reviewed to identify opportunities to create safer pathways for students. Existing bike and pedestrian pathways are evaluated to pinpoint gaps and disconnected routes, and traffic problem areas are addressed to improve overall mobility and safety. These insights provide a foundation for enhancing Newark's transportation network in future planning efforts.

WHAT ARE COMPLETE STREETS?

» Complete Streets are roadways designed, implemented, operated, and maintained in an equitable and context-sensitive manner so that people of all ages, incomes, and abilities can use them safely.

COMPLETE STREETS LEGISLATION

The Complete Streets legislation in Newark, Ohio, represents a significant step toward creating a more inclusive and sustainable transportation network.

The policy aims to enhance mobility by ensuring that streets are safe and accessible for all users, including pedestrians, cyclists, children, seniors, people with disabilities, and transit users. By integrating a range of transportation options into roadway design, the legislation focuses on enhancing community livability, improving public health, and supporting economic vitality through better access and efficient movement.

While this legislation is a proactive measure toward creating more inclusive streets, there are opportunities to further strengthen the approach. Future improvements could include a stronger emphasis on community engagement in identifying local needs, establishing performance metrics to track the success of implemented Complete Streets projects, and increasing funding mechanisms specifically for pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure. Additionally, periodic reviews and updates to the legislation could ensure that it continues to meet the evolving needs of Newark's residents and addresses any emerging transportation challenges.

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

There are four schools included in the 2011 School Travel Plan – Hillview Elementary, Legend Elementary, Heritage Middle School, and Wilson Middle School. Each faces a unique set of challenges regarding transportation. Common issues include poor existing sidewalk conditions, lack of safe sidewalk (or trail) connections, insufficient crossings for busy roads, inadequate lighting for winter months, congestion due to schools only being designed for transportation via school bus, and fear from parents regarding children walking alone. Hillview Elementary School and Heritage Middle School both overlap with the study area.

Heritage Middle School

- » Lack of sidewalk along Oakwood Avenue between Arlington and Garfield Avenues.
- » Congestion at the school and along Arlington Avenue.

Streets connecting to Heritage Middle School (Oakwood Avenue, Cedar Street, and Manning Street) are steep, narrow, and accompanied by substandard or missing sidewalks, making it difficult for students to safely walk or bike to school. A high volume of vehicular traffic along Arlington Avenue also poses a safety concern.



Hillview Elementary School

- » Lack of sidewalk connections from school property to adjacent neighborhoods.
- » Specifically, there are no connections from the school to Renae and Earl Drive.
- » Kelley Road, located father north, has no sidewalk.
- » Located on Hills Horn Road, which is dangerous to walk or bike on due to high volumes of traffic and curves limiting visibility.
- » Need alternative route.

Located in the upper east corner of the City of Newark, along Horns Hills Road, Hillview Elementary School does not provide adequate pedestrian or bike access. Sidewalks do not connect from the school to the road. This has led to 100% of students arriving at school via school bus, family vehicle, or carpool in the morning, and 97% in the afternoon. Due to the dangerous conditions of Horns Hill Road, only a separate multi-use path would be an acceptable alternative to encourage safe transit along Horns Hill Road. The path would need to be free of tree screens or obstruction to ensure visibility and safety. Additionally, there is a drainage ditch to the north and northwest of the school, leading to students needing to cut across private property. High levels of congestion are present during arrival and dismissal times due to the school being designed for transit via school buses and no other modes of transit.

A loop was added to the parking lot at Hillview Elementary school to accommodate student pick-up and drop off. Furthermore, a strategy to stack cars in three lanes has helped with traffic flow. The new Conor's Pass neighborhood is not connected to the school via sidewalk, nor are there funds for a sidewalk. Students who attend the school or will attend the school are required to drive or travel along the drainage ditch on Horns Hill Road.

TRANSPORTATION

DISCONTINUITY, CURRENT ROUTES, & COMMUTING

CURRENT PATHWAYS

It's important that trails added in annexed regions create continuity in terms of trail connectivity and signage. New trails in annexed area should connect to the Panhandle Trail and East Newark Trail, both are in northeast Newark. Bike racks are prevalent in downtown Newark but limited in other areas. Racks should be added near amenities throughout the city.

DISCONNECTED ROUTES

There is a disconnect between the T.J. Evans trail that begins on the west side of Newark and the Panhandle Trail on the east side. Prior feedback shows that residents show most concern with connecting gaps in the current transportation network to access recreational and shopping destinations.

HORNS HILL ROAD CORRIDOR

The Horn's Hill Road corridor project study, conducted by Jobes Henderson & Associates in 2005, aimed to provide a secondary access route to the Horn's Hill Road area, addressing a long-standing community need. The project involved road realignment to eliminate hazardous curves, construction of a bridge over the North Fork Licking River, and potential future connectivity to N. 21st Street.

Despite challenges such as floodplain issues, environmental concerns, and railroad crossing permits, the project was deemed feasible due to minimal right-of-way costs, community support, and favorable site conditions. To move forward, a detailed feasibility study, permit acquisition, funding plan development, and community engagement were recommended.


DRIVE TIME ANALYSIS

The drive time analysis focuses on Horns Hill Road that falls within the study area to understand northeast Newark's connectivity to nearby regions. By examining driving distances of 15, 25, and 35 minutes, it provides insights into accessibility patterns and proximity to major highways, including the northeastern edge of the Columbus metro area near I-270. This analysis helps guide local infrastructure planning, aiming to improve accessibility and better connect Newark with surrounding communities.

The following map highlights northeast Newark's accessibility to the Columbus metropolitan area and emphasizes its strategic location as a residential hub for those working in and around Columbus, with varying levels of proximity reflected in the different drive times.

DRIVE TIME ANALYSIS

- » 15-Minute Drive Time: The dark green area represents the 15-minute drive from the study area. This zone encompasses much of the city and surrounding areas, indicating accessibility within a short commute. This could make Newark an attractive option for those seeking proximity to local amenities and businesses.
- » 25-Minute Drive Time: The second layer in lighter green shows areas accessible within a 25-minute drive. This range extends further from the core of Newark, reaching into more rural and suburban areas. It suggests that the city serves as a convenient hub for neighboring residential zones that are slightly further out but still within a manageable commuting distance.
- » 35-Minute Drive Time: The lightest green section represents a 35-minute driving distance, extending toward the northeastern edge of the Columbus metropolitan area, near I-270. This positioning makes Newark a potential residential community for individuals who work in or commute to Columbus, especially with convenient access to the I-270 corridor. The drive time to Columbus allows Newark to be considered part of the extended Columbus metro, offering potential for commuter growth and regional integration. This accessibility can influence future development strategies and transportation planning to accommodate commuting patterns.



LAND USE

ZONING, SUBDIVISION ORDINANCES, & ANNEXATION

While the western side of Horns Hill Road (east of the river) is mostly within the City of Newark, some sections of the eastern side are part of Newark Township and Newton Township, east of Newark city limit. This study includes parcels out of the city boundary as there are future possibilities of annexation.



NEWARK ZONING




Figure 4. City of Newark Zoning Designations

The study area features a diverse mix of zoning that reflects a blend of residential, commercial, industrial, and institutional uses (see Figure 4: City of Newark Zoning Designation.

Conservation District (CD) zoning emphasizes preserving natural areas, maintaining green spaces within the community. The Church School Institutional (CSI) zoning supports religious, educational, and community-oriented facilities, fostering a sense of community and providing essential services. Residential zoning varies significantly, ranging from Suburban Single Family Residential (RS) to Low Density (RL), Medium Density (RM), and Multi-Family Condominium (MFC) districts.

This mix offers a variety of housing options, from spacious single-family homes to higher-density apartments and condominiums, catering to diverse living preferences and promoting neighborhood diversity. On the commercial and industrial side, the General Commercial (GC) and General Industrial (GI) zones support business, retail, and industrial activities, driving economic development and employment opportunities.

The presence of these zones indicates that the area is not only focused on residential development but also aims to foster economic growth and provide a balanced urban environment. The zoning in the study area supports a wide range of land uses, offering a well-rounded community with residential choices, business opportunities, and preserved natural spaces.

TOWNSHIP ZONING




Figure 5. Adjacent Jurisdictions' Zoning Designations

In analyzing the zoning of the areas falling within the study boundary, it was observed that sections of Newark Township, Newton Township, Madison Township, and Mary Ann Township were included (see Figure 5: Adjacent Jurisdictions' Zoning Designations). Of these, Mary Ann Township is the only unzoned jurisdiction. Most parcels within the boundary are zoned for agricultural use.

For Madison Township, the majority of parcels within the study area fall under Agricultural District (AG) zoning, with a smaller portion zoned as Single-Family Residential District (R-1). Newton Township similarly features a predominance of Agricultural District (AG) zoning, alongside some parcels zoned as Single Family Residential (RS), Suburban Residential District (R-1), and General Business District (B-2).

Newark Township, in contrast, has a more diverse zoning within the study area, including General Business (B-2), Conservation (C-1), Single Family Residence (R-1), General Residence (R-2), and Medium-Density Residence (R-3). This diversity highlights a mix of residential, commercial, and conservation zones within Newark Township, offering different opportunities for land use compared to the predominantly agricultural zoning seen in the other townships.

SUBDIVISION ORDINANCES

The subdivision ordinance serves to ensure logical, sound, and economically viable development while safeguarding public health, safety, and welfare. It distinguishes between two types of subdivisions: Lot Split/Minor Subdivision (involving five or fewer parcels) and Major Subdivision, which requires a detailed approval process through three stages—sketch plat, preliminary plat, and final plat.

Design standards mandate specific street classifications and ensure safe access in alignment with existing thoroughfare plans. Sidewalks must be built on both sides of new streets, and utilities should be placed underground where feasible.

Developers are required to install necessary infrastructure, including streets, sidewalks, and drainage systems, before the final plat is recorded or provide financial guarantees. Grading and erosion control measures are mandatory, with emphasis on tree retention and stormwater management. The Planning Commission administers these regulations, ensuring compliance and applying penalties for unauthorized subdivision activities.

ANNEXATION

- » Newly annexed land remains under its former township zoning regulations until it is rezoned by the city.
- » Landowners must apply for rezoning within 60 days after the annexation is completed. If they don't, the Planning Commission may initiate the process within the next 30 days.
- » In determining the new zoning classification, the Planning Commission considers the previous zoning, adjacent zoning districts, traffic and safety issues, and the overall benefit to the city.
- » The Planning Commission will also recommend how the annexed land should be designated on the Off-Premises Sign Map.
- » No zoning permits will be issued for the land until it is rezoned, or if 210 days pass without action from the City Council, at which point permits may be issued for uses permitted under the old township zoning.

HOUSING

The housing profile of Newark, OH, provides a detailed examination of the city's evolving residential dynamics, with a focus on trends in homeownership, rental patterns, occupancy rates, housing stock characteristics, and housing costs. This section explores housing tenure, occupancy rates, the availability of units, and the cost of housing as a percentage of income using the American Community Survey (ACS) 1-Year Estimates.

The findings present a nuanced understanding of the city's housing challenges and opportunities, ultimately resulting in identifying key highlights that emphasize affordability concerns, pressures on the rental market, and broader development trends critical to Newark's future growth.

STOCK AVAILABILITY


The housing stock in Newark, OH, reflects a mix of development periods, indicating diverse growth phases throughout the city's history. Notable developments in the township outside city boundaries include the mid-20th century residential growth in the Horns Hill area. Developments such as the Meadowbrooke Addition in 1958 added 37 lots, followed by the North Fork Valley View Allotment in 1962 with 33 lots, and the Horns Hill-View Subdivision in 1963 with 40 lots. Suburban Meadows Addition contributed the largest number of lots in this area, adding 71 lots in 1965. Additionally, smaller developments such as Sleepy Valley, built in 1965 with 16 lots and expanded in 1974 with 3 more lots, align with the housing boom observed in Newark during this time.

The largest share of homes in Newark was constructed between 1960 and 1979, accounting for 28.0% of the housing units, signifying a significant growth period during that time. Homes built in 1939 or earlier make up 26.1% of the stock, highlighting the historic character of Newark's residential areas. Housing constructed between 1980 and 1999 accounts for 19.2%, while units built between 1940 and 1959 represent 18.3% of the total, indicating a steady pace of development during the mid-20th century.

More recently, the rate of new construction has slowed. Homes built from 2000 to 2019 account for just 7.4% of the housing stock, while the most recent period (2020 or later) represents only 0.8%, reflecting a modest pace of new development.

Despite the low levels of recent construction, growth in Newark has continued, likely relying on the utilization of existing vacant units as demand increased, as evidenced by declining vacancy rates. This limited new construction may have contributed to a tighter housing market, with the potential for rising housing costs due to limited availability.

OCCUPANCY STATUS

The occupancy status data for Newark, OH, from 2014 to 2023 reveals notable trends in the proportion of occupied and vacant housing units, reflecting shifts in housing demand and market stability. In 2014, the occupancy rate was 92.7%, with vacant units making up 7.3% of the total housing stock. This indicated a healthy housing market with high demand and limited vacancies. However, by 2018, the percentage of occupied units had dropped significantly to 84.6%, while vacant units increased to 13.9%. This trend suggests a period of weaker housing demand, potentially due to economic shifts or changes in population dynamics, leading to an increase in the availability of vacant housing.

By 2023, the occupancy rate had rebounded to 94.5%, with vacant units decreasing to 6.9%. This reflects a strong recovery in the housing market, where demand for housing increased significantly, leading to a sharp reduction in vacancies. The data suggests that the housing market in Newark has stabilized in recent years, with a trend toward higher occupancy rates and fewer vacant units, which indicates a healthier balance between housing supply and demand.

HOUSING TENURE

The housing tenure in Newark has experienced noticeable shifts between 2014 and 2023, with a trend toward increasing homeownership. In 2014, owner-occupied units constituted 52% of all housing units, while renter-occupied units made up 48%. By 2018, the percentage of owner-occupied units had slightly increased to 53%, while renter-occupied units decreased to 47%. This indicated a gradual trend toward more households owning their homes rather than renting.

The most notable change occurred by 2023, with owner-occupied units rising to 59% of the total housing units, reflecting a considerable growth in homeownership over the decade. Correspondingly, renter-occupied units declined to 41%. This trend suggests a shift toward a more stable housing tenure with fewer rentals, indicating increased opportunities or preferences for homeownership among Newark residents over the years

Figure 7. Housing Occupancy Status





Figure 8. Housing Tenure



HOUSEHOLD INCOME & HOUSING COST

OVERVIEW

The median household income for Newark's residents stands at \$56,284, but a closer look shows notable differences between homeowners and renters. Owner-occupied households have a higher median income of \$73,264, reflecting more financial stability. Renter-occupied households have a median income of \$35,268, indicating a lower income level and suggesting potential affordability challenges for renters.

The income distribution across households further highlights this divide. The largest share of homeowners falls into the \$50,000 to \$74,999 range (21.3%), followed by the \$100,000 to \$149,999 bracket (18.6%).

On the other hand, the highest proportion of renters falls within the \$35,000 to \$49,999 (14.8%) and \$25,000 to \$34,999 (11.9%) income ranges. It is important to note that a small but significant segment of renters (10.5%) earns less than \$10,000, highlighting the need for affordable rental options.



MONTHLY HOUSING COSTS

The median monthly housing cost for all units is \$907, but costs vary depending on tenure. For homeowners, the median monthly cost is \$932, while for renters, it is slightly lower at \$882. Most households, regardless of tenure, fall within the \$1,000 to \$1,499 cost range (27%), reflecting a mid-range affordability.

However, the cost burden becomes apparent for renters in lower income brackets, as 28.1% of renters pay between \$500 and \$799 per month, indicating a reliance on lower-cost rental options. The data also reveals that 363 renters (4% of all renters) pay no cash rent, suggesting the presence of subsidized housing, employer-provided housing, or informal arrangements with family or friends.

HOUSING COSTS AS A PERCENTAGE OF INCOME

Examining housing costs as a percentage of income reveals important insights into affordability. High-income households (earning \$75,000 or more) generally spend less than 20% of their income on housing, indicating strong affordability. Among those earning \$50,000 to \$74,999, 58% spend less than 20% of their income on housing, indicating a reasonable level of affordability.

However, among households earning \$35,000 to \$49,999, 26% spend 30% or more of their income on housing, indicating a potential cost burden. Households with zero or negative income face the highest levels of cost burden, with 70% likely spending more than 30% of their income (or the equivalent) on housing costs.

SUMMARY

The data suggests that the NE Area of Newark is likely to face challenges related to housing affordability, especially for lower-income renters. As development continues, prioritizing affordable rental options will be critical to address the cost burdens experienced by many renters. Higher homeownership rates and the income disparity between owners and renters indicate the need for more equitable housing opportunities.

To support future growth in the NE Area, policies focusing on affordable housing development, reducing housing cost burdens, and ensuring accessibility for both low- and middle-income households will be essential for balanced and sustainable community development.

KEY TAKEAWAYS

ECONOMY

GROW LICKING COUNTY

The GROW Licking County Plan was developed in 2018 by the Montrose Group, LLC, and the GROW Licking County Community Improvement Corporation, which serves as the lead economic development corporation in Licking County.

GROW Licking County is now a community improvement corp that assesses the growth and economic development in the county thus far, identifies the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats to economic development, and sets short-, medium-, and long-term goals that will promote smart growth and economic prosperity across the county.

The City of Newark has a steady workforce. Approximately 24,000 residents are in the civilian labor force and 17,000 residents are not. Out of the population not within the labor force, only 960 of those residents are formally unemployed; the remaining residents are neither absent from their job, nor on layoff, nor actively looking and available for work.

Currently, the regional population is older, with approximately 23,000 residents aged 45 or older, and 17,000 residents between 18 and 44 years. Approximately 4,200 residents between the ages of 12 and 17 will enter the workforce in coming years.

In 2022, Intel Corporation announced a \$20 billion microchip manufacturing site that will be constructed in the New Albany Business Parks. Approximately 7,000 construction positions will be required to build the plant, while an additional 3,000 jobs will be created when the plant becomes operational.

Tens of thousands of job opportunities are expected to open as suppliers collaborate with Intel and other business to meet the demand for housing, amenities, and other services that will support the new workforce.

UTILITIES

WATER

The Divisions of Water and Wastewater in the City of Newark provide water distribution and wastewater treatment services to over 47,000 residents in the City of Newark for municipal and industrial purposes. The City of Newark Street Department also provides seasonal services such as leaf pick up and snow removal. Currently, the water distribution system has over 18,300 connections and includes about 190 miles of water main.

The City of Newark is currently working on making its water system lead free. There is an ongoing project to identify and replace non-copper or plastic service lines within the system. Some replacements have already been made, with the project expected to be completed by 2028.

The Newark Water Treatment Plant (WTP) uses lime softening processes to treat 15 MGD (million gallons per day) with a design average flow of 11.5 MGD. The City reports that the current annual peak flow is 9.5 MGD and the annual average is typically around 8.0 MGD. By comparing the typical flow rate of 8.0 MGD with the nearly 48,000 residents who use the WTP, the treatment plant can serve an estimated 20,000 additional customers before meeting the design average flow of 11.5 MGD

ELECTRICITY

Newark largely depends on the Ohio Power Company (AEP) and the Energy Cooperative to meet electricity needs. The Energy Cooperative includes Licking Rural Electrification, Inc. (LRE), who purchases energy from Buckeye Power. LRE serves more than 27,046 members in Central Ohio, including Newark, and oversees about 3,000 miles of distribution lines, 40 miles of transmission lines, 20 substations and three switching stations.

NATURAL GAS

The Energy Cooperative and Columbia Gas are two of the largest providers of natural gas to Licking County residents. The Energy Cooperative manages the Natural Gas & Oil (NGO) Company and NGO Transmission. NGO Transmission provides service through a network of 155 miles of transmission pipelines and three underground gas storage fields.

BROADBAND INTERNET

Following the COVID-19 pandemic and consequential lockdown, broadband internet access is an emerging utility topic of concern. According to the Ohio Department of Development, approximately 47% of the populated area in Licking County and 12% of households do not have access to reliable internet speed minimums of 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload (25/3).

Although much of the study area does have reliable internet speeds of over 25 Mbps, communities in the northernmost section of the study area have internet speeds less than 25/3. Future development in the northern section of the study area should include the expansion of broadband internet.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES

CURRENT GREENSPACE

he environmental resources section of this vision study explores existing greenspaces and the various environmental hazards impacting the region. Current greenspaces serve as vital community assets, contributing to the quality of life and ecological balance. However, the study area also faces several environmental challenges, including droughts, floods, severe weather, and invasive species. These hazards have varying impacts, from water scarcity and habitat disruption to damage to infrastructure and biodiversity loss. Understanding these factors is crucial to planning for a resilient future, ensuring greenspaces are protected, and identifying mitigation strategies that can address the ongoing and emerging environmental risks effectively.

CURRENT GREENSPACE

The Northeast Area of Newark is home to three parks, one golf course, and a cemetery. Each of these resources can serve as a space for natural recreation, as parks are available to the public, golfing is a form of recreation, and cemeteries are the earliest form of greenspace in urban planning.

According to available data, approximately half of the available greenspace is open to the public. Furthermore, a majority of the available greenspace open to the public is in the southern section of this study area. Unincorporated territory may be used to expand recreation in this section of Newark.




Figure 10. Distribution of Greenspace Across the NE Corridor Study Area

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES

HAZARDS

In 2021, Licking County published their Countywide All Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan, or CANHMP. The purpose of this plan was to create a roadmap of the natural hazards that impact the community and actionable items to mitigate those impacts. As a multi-jurisdictional plan, the CANHMP considered hazards that could impact its cities, villages, and townships. Each jurisdiction provided as much data as possible to support the efforts, including the City of Newark, Newton Township, Mary Ann Township, and Newark Township.

According to the CANHMP, the following hazards pose a risk to the study area:

DROUGHT

A drought is a period of abnormally dry weather that results in a hydrologic imbalance, such as crop loss, water shortages, etc. Because droughts do not have a clear geographic or temporal boundary, droughts are divided into four categories that are measured using different metrics: meteorological drought, hydrological drought, agricultural drought, and socioeconomic drought.

Meteorological droughts are the most recognized droughts and are defined as a period with dry weather conditions and less precipitation than usual. Hydrological droughts typically result from sustained meteorological droughts and are defined by a reduction in regional ground and surface water supply. Agricultural droughts are defined by crop loss due to reduced water supply or dry weather conditions. Socioeconomic droughts occur when community resources, such as food, water, and electricity, are unable to meet the demand due to dry weather and reduced precipitation.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, Licking County has observed 12 moderate to severe droughts since 2000.

FLOODING


A flash flood is a sudden overflowing of a large amount of water that occurs following a period of heavy rain. Riverine flooding occurs when streams and rivers exceed the capacity of their natural channels and overflow onto the banks and adjacent low-lying, dry land. The study area is bordered to the West by the North Fork Licking River with tributaries, such as Cedar Run Creek, running through the study area. In the northernmost section the study area is Wilkins Run, which connects with the Licking River near State Route 16.

According to the NCEI Weather Events Database, a flash flood was recorded in Newark in 2020 during a series of thunderstorms. The flash flood caused a sinkhole and an estimated \$50,000 in property damage. The maps in Appendix A detail the areas near the North Fork Licking River which are designated as a regulatory floodway. Adjacent to the North Fork Licking River and Wilkins Run are areas with 1% annual chance flood hazard.

The threat of a flash flood and riverine flooding are highest near waterways and drainage areas. Increased intensity and unpredictability of storms can result in more flooding, especially in areas that have not seen flooding before. Furthermore, development within a floodplain can influence the direction and flow of water during a high water or flood event.

In June 2024, the Licking County Planning Commission amended their Flood Damage Prevention Regulations to include updated maps regarding flood insurance requirements, as well as the latest FEMA requirements related to construction in a floodplain. The Flood Damage Prevention Regulations should serve as a guide for all new developments in the study area.

EARTHQUAKE

Ohio is within proximity of the New Madrid Seismic Zone in New Madrid, Missouri. In the winter of 1811 and 1812 the New Madrid seismic zone produced several large earthquakes that were felt in Ohio and as far as Hartford, Connecticut. To monitor future earthquakes and record seismic activity beneath Ohio, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources manages 29 seismograph stations. Licking County and the City of Newark are at low risk of earthquakes.

WILDFIRE

A wildfire is an unplanned fire that burns in a natural area, such as a forest, grassland, or prairie. Wildfires are not uncommon in Ohio; according to the Ohio Emergency Management Agency, the state sees an average of 800 wildfires burning 4,000 acres of forest and grassland each year. According to Federal Emergency Management Agency, Licking County is generally at a very low risk of wildfire. However, depending on weather conditions, surrounding vegetation, and fire management, wildfires are possible and can become large throughout the region. Despite its generally low risk, all Licking County falls within the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Forestry wildfire protection area, where wildlife occurrence data is collected. In Licking County's history, nearly every fire was caused by human error. However, this means education and awareness can be effective tools to reduce the frequency and likelihood of fire.

INVASIVE SPECIES

Invasive species are flora, fauna, or microorganisms that are not native to a region but cause economic or ecological harm when introduced. There are currently 6,500 nonindigenous species of organisms in the United States that pose a risk to local ecosystems, the economy, and public health. Approximately 245 invasive species have been reported in Licking County.

MAIN PLANT SPECIES OF CONCERN

- Bush and vine honeysuckles (Lonicera japonica, L. maackii, L. morrowii, L. tartarica)
- » Wintercreeper and Winged Euonymus (Euonymus alatus, E. fortune)
- » Japanese Knotweed (Polygonum cuspidatum)
- » Phragmites/Common Reed Grass (Phragmites australis)
- » Bradford Pear (Pyrus calleryana)
- » English Ivy, Myrtle, and Asiatic Bittersweet (Hedra helix, Vinca minor, Celastrus orbiculatus)
- » Japanese Barberry and Privet (Berberis thunbergii, Ligustrum sp.)
- » Tree of Heaven (Alianthus altissima)
- » Garlic Mustard (Alliaria petiolate)

The Spotted Lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula) is an emerging invasive pest that can destroy grapevines, black walnut saplings, and the Tree of Heaven. Although it prefers the Tree of Heaven, it is known to also be a pest of grapes, hops, stone fruits, and other agriculturally important plants. If Spotted Lanternfly infestations are significant within a county, the Ohio Department of Agriculture will issue a county-wide quarantine to increase inspections and restrict movement of certain items from the quarantined county to other parts of the state. Although Licking County is not currently quarantined, monitoring and controlling for the spotted lanternfly will aid in managing pest damage and avoiding quarantine.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES

HAZARDS

SEVERE SUMMER WEATHER

Severe summer weather is defined as any thunderstorm, lightning, hail, or damaging wind event. As the name suggests, severe summer weather typically occurs during the summer months but can happen at any time of year.

In Licking County, severe summer weather is a common occurrence. The following table lists the past occurrence of thunderstorms, hail, and damaging winds from 2000 to 2024 for Newark and the surrounding areas. While this data is an accurate representation of historical weather events, it relies on a variety of sources, including state and federal emergency management officials, local law enforcement officials, NWS damage surveys, newspaper clipping services, the insurance industry, and the public. Therefore, unreported injuries and property damage data may not be fully represented.

The events recorded were those specific to Newark and surrounding area. However, severe summer weather is a widespread phenomenon that can cover multiple counties and jurisdictions. Therefore, the values may be an underrepresentation of the true number of storms that were experienced in the Newark Visioning Study Area.

Notable Summer Weather Events

On September 14, 2008, remnants of Hurricane Ike merged with a frontal boundary across the lower Ohio Valley causing winds over 70 miles per hour for several hours. Damage to crops and power lines occurred across Ohio, including the study area, resulting in an event-wide property total of \$18.4 million. Although severe storms can be caused by non-hurricane forces, the Fifth National Climate Assessment reports that hurricane decay has slowed since the 1960s and has enabled storms to extend further inland. Thus, severe storms, flooding, and wind from hurricanes may become more common.

On June 29, 2012, a hot, unstable air mass produced a derecho in Illinois and moved rapidly across the Midwest into the Ohio Valley, producing straight line wind damage and isolated hail. Widespread power outages, fallen trees, and property damage occurred. In Ohio, seven people were injured and one person died. In Licking County, wind gusts of 75 mph and 0.88-inch hail were reported. Approximately \$58,000 of property damage occurred in Licking County and \$35.6 million of property damage occurred across Ohio.

CONSIDERATIONS

The extent and damage from a severe summer storm will vary depending on the weather conditions, built environment, and nature of the storm. Maintaining power lines, roads, and trees, as well as building resilient infrastructure are all paramount to resilience against severe summer weather.

HAZARDS

TORNADO

Tornadoes are formed under specific atmospheric conditions when an updraft meets the rotating air of a downdraft. Tornadoes are more likely to occur during severe storms, such as supercells, but are also known to occur during hurricanes, fires, and over water. It is important to note that not all supercells can produce a tornado, and not all rotating wind becomes a tornado.

Tornadoes only occur under the right conditions and have been known to occur in in every state of the United States, in every continent on Earth, on any day of the year, and at any hour. However, they are most common in the central plains of North America, during the spring and summer months, and in the late afternoon or early evening.

Thanks to technological advancements and the invention of the Doppler radar, tornadoes are easier to spot with radar. This technology is still not perfect and continues to rely on citizen volunteers, spotters, and the National Weather Service to issue tornado watches, identify tornadoes, and issue warnings.

In the late evening on April 19, 2011, and into the early morning of April 20, 2011, a line of storms moved through Licking County and over Newark, forming a tornado. A path of damage was observed from Heath to the Newark-Heath Airport, causing approximately \$45,000 in combined property damage. Several trees were snapped or completely uprooted. Based on the damage, the maximum wind speed was estimated to be around 120 miles per hour.

Tornadoes are sporadic and can form with little notice. Accurate identification, reporting, and action can reduce the impact of tornadoes.

SEVERE WINTER WEATHER

Severe winter weather is defined as any ice or snowstorm, extreme cold, or heavy snowfall. As the name implies, severe winter weather tends to only occur during the winter months. Unlike severe summer weather, severe winter weather is less common due to the location of Newark.

A winter storm warning is issued when four or more inches of snow or sleet are expected to fall in the next 12 hours, or six or more inches of snow or sleet are expected to fall in 24 hours. A winter storm warning is also issued when 0.25 inches or more of ice are expected, or if the snowfall is expected to occur during peak traffic hours. Severe winter weather may also be accompanied by high winds, extremely low temperatures, and snow drifts.

The following table contains the complete collection of severe winter events that have occurred in or around the City of Newark between 2000 and 2024. Although these events are specific to Newark, it is important to acknowledge that even minor snowfall or ice events may result in traffic delays, property damage, or personal injury.

Although winter weather generally has a minimal impact on the study area, sporadic fluctuations in weather patterns can lead to widespread damage. On April 6, 2007, a sudden cold snap with temperatures in the low 20s covered 31 counties in Ohio Valley, including Licking County. This event occurred after an unseasonably warm March, during which many farmers took advantage of the early agricultural growing season. Crop damage, split evenly across the affected counties, was estimated to be \$16.74 million.

DESTINY 2020

Destiny 2020 is a citizen-driven plan that was adopted in 2002 with the intention of driving strategic growth and investments in the City of Newark. The planning process was steered by a 60-person committee and the plan was developed using feedback from over 400 people and workshops centered around idea gathering, goal setting, and land use scenarios.

In addition to recommendations, the plan includes objectives and strategies that relate to the goals of land use, environment and natural resources, transportation, economy, plan implementation, and communities, facilities, and services. When considering the direction of future development and redevelopment in the region, the following eleven principles were devised. These principles are the result of the brainstorming during idea gathering and goal setting workshops, as well as the review of land use scenarios.

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

- » Designate an implementation task force,
- » Enhance community appearance (target major roadways, sidewalk repair; and enforce property maintenance),
- » Institute fiscal management policies (direct taxes towards older areas and reevaluate tax abatements),
- » Establish formal business retention and expansion,
- » Upgrade and extend utilities in strategic directions,
- » Revise development regulations,
- » Manage traffic flow (including connecting northeast and northwest Newark),
- » Balance land uses, and
- » Adaptively re-use existing commercial and industrial sites and facilities.

Destiny 2020 Principles

- » Physically connect the community by encouraging walking, biking, and other forms of affordable transportation.
- » Consider the importance of downtown character and economic viability as a priority in the redevelopment of adjacent properties and neighborhoods.
- » Utilize land and capital resources efficiently by building at higher densities and integrate compatible land uses where possible.
- » Protect and enhance existing viable neighborhoods and places.
- » Provide open space within new development and protect existing natural resources.
- » Put infrastructure improvements in place prior to development or redevelopment.
- » Discourage development along steeply sloping hillsides and within riparian corridors.
- » Utilize greenways along riparian corridors as an alternative method of linking communities.
- » Reinvest in areas with existing infrastructure that have demonstrated capacity as an alternative to building new infrastructure.
- » Transition or buffer less intense uses from more intense uses.
- » Evaluate the impact of new development on fiscal resources.

NEWARK VISION PLAN 2028


The Newark Vision Plan 2028 was created through a partnership between the Board of Newark Development Partners (NDP), local governments, small business owners, property owners, elected and appointed officials, and citizens within the City of Newark. The document is intended to be used as a tool to inform leaders of physical, economic, and social trends and guide development so future decisions will collectively work towards a common goal.

The plan was organized around seven key pillars, each of which includes long-term goals for the region and strategic steps for incremental implementation.

The NDP recommended that implementation be monitored by an action committee consisting of local leaders and community members that are committed to improving quality of life in Newark. The action committee would be divided into subgroups, each of which would be responsible for overseeing actions pertaining to one of the seven pillars. Members of the action plan committee are intended to serve as stewards of the Newark Vision Plan 2028 to ensure its success.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

BACKGROUND

Public engagement was used to capture the wants and needs of the public who reside, work, travel through, and visit the study area. A survey containing questions regarding the respondents' relationship to the study area, observations of existing conditions, and wants for the future was the most efficient method for receiving this feedback.

The survey was distributed in an email to public employees, city school officials, local businesses, councilmembers, and county officials. The city also posted digital flyers on Facebook on five separate occasions. Printed flyers were distributed across key points of the region, including the local golf club and in the lobby of city buildings. Finally, a representative from the City of Newark discussed the survey in a radio interview.


RESPONDENT BREAKDOWN

- » 305 total responses
- » 144 responses from residents of Northeast Newark
- » 54 responses from township residents within the study area
- » 38% shop within the study area
- » 30% visit the study area for shopping or recreation
- » Half of respondents live in a household of two (42%) or fewer (9%) people.
- » Two-thirds of respondents have no school-going children (66%).

Commute Habits:


- » 29% commute through the study area
- » The most popular mode of transportation for commuting is driving alone (86%).
- » Wide range of commute destinations; Newark was the most common commute destination (49%), Columbus is the second-highest commute desination (12%).





When given three words to describe what they liked about the northeast Newark area, respondents called the area "quiet," "rural," "country," and "peaceful." Many of the words chosen for this prompt centered around the spacious, natural feel of the study area, including an abundance of trees, quiet scenery, and seclusion from neighbors.

LOOKING FORWARD

When asked about their priorities for the region in the next 3-5 years, respondents sought improved traffic flow (55%), regional beautification, such as public art and clean streets (48%), and increased public safety (40%). Residents who selected those priorities described the study area as a place with "one way in, one way out" and cited traffic and safety concerns along Horns Hill Road. Residents also felt strongly about preserving existing greenspace, repairing the local pool, and cleaning up Horn's Hill Park.

AREAS OF AGREEMENT

- » Road safety for pedestrians and cyclists is a problem in the study area (78% agreed or strongly agreed).
- There is too much traffic congestion in the area (71% agreed or strongly agreed).
- » Changes are wanted in the study area (65% agreed or strongly agreed).
- » There should be more parks and places for recreation (75% agreed or strongly agreed).
- » New developments in the area are a concern (67% agreed or strongly agreed).


Reflecting on the past and future for the region, respondents noted that the region has seen increased housing development and traffic over the last ten years, as well as an increase in panhandling and homelessness along Horns Hill Rd. Residents also appreciated the new bike trails at Horns Hill Park and acknowledged new renovations and cleanliness in the region. When asked whether development would have an impact on northeast Newark, responses were divided as to whether those impacts would be positive or negative.

AREAS OF DISAGREEMENT

Reactions to the following statements were mixed:

- » "The area has improved over the last ten years."
- "The streets and public spaces offer a save environment."
- » "More places to shop would improve the area."
- "I am concerned about the cost of housing in the region."
- "I am concerned about the availability of housing in the region."
- » "It is difficult to access public transit in the area."

KEY TAKEAWAYS

When looking forward, residents strongly emphasized their desire to see more green space and opportunities for outdoor recreation. Respondents also wanted to see more family-oriented planning, such as emphasizing traffic and pedestrian safety, and constructing bike trails along the river and leading to local schools. Finally, respondents were inspired by the growth occurring in New Albany, Dublin, and Worthington, and wanted to see a greater variety of businesses and educational opportunities for residents, while still maintaining the charm of a smaller town.

Finally, respondents were given the opportunity to add additional comments. These comments included a request for more sit-down restaurants, creating more opportunities for resident engagement, extending water and sewer utilities, and establishing standards for trees, unit size, and property cost. Recommendations for traffic management included fresh paving Horns Hill Rd., creating designated turning lanes at the intersection of State Route 13 and State Route 657, adding a roundabout at Cedar Run and State Route 79, and increasing access to State Route 13 and State Route 79.




